Staff Elections Challenge

An Focal has learnt that the validity of one, and possibly two, of the elections held among the academic staff may be challenged at the next Governing Body meeting, following complaints of some irregularities. A number of sources have told An Focal that some members of the academic staff were issued with two ballot papers. It is understood that these papers issued in error were returned before balloting commenced.

However, An Focal has confirmed with the Deans office in two colleges that one lecturer remained on both registers of electors and this could have significantly affected the result in at least one of the University's four colleges.

The elections were among the academic staff to elect eight members of the University's Academic Council, a body within the University set up by law.

A number of the people who were elected are known to be critical of management policies and the overall result is being viewed by many in the University as a challenge to to many aspects of the academic policy of the University. This is the second setback for the University management in this area in recent months. At the last Governing Body meeting a proposal from the President, Dr Walsh, was rejected in favour of an amendment proposed by the staff and student members of Governing Body. Dr Walsh had proposed that only four members be elected by the academic staff, but Governing Body agreed to increase this to eight.

The presence of these members will be particularly important because Governing

Body also decided to reduce the overall size of Academic Council. They will therefore constitute a larger block within the council This could affect results of votes, especially when appointed members of the Council are absent.

Most prominent among those elected is Ms Patricia Palmer, lecturer in the Department of Business. She has been critical of the University's approach to the arts. In an article in The Irish Review, published in spring 1990 she wrote "The School (sic) of Humanities...is less an arts faculty than its deliberate replacement". She went on to say that the "University was seen to empty the arts of their real meaning". Another of the successful candidates is believed to have said during the campaign that he had

gone as far as he was going to in respect of promotion and was therefore free to raise contentious issues at Academic Council. A third person, who was also on the last Academic Council, was strongly critical of the University's decision to adopt NUI regulation in relation to entry requirements to UL. From 1992 all students entering UL will be required to have a modern European Language in their Leaving Certificate.

The other members of the Council are automatically appointed because of positions they hold. They are the President and the Registrar of the Univerity, the five Deans, the Heads of Department, two of the Students' Unions sabbatical officers and the President of the Postgraduate Students Association.

Maths Intervarsity Being Organised

The Department of Applied Mathematics is looking for candidates to represent the University of Limerick in the third Irish

Mathematics Intervarsity, planned to take part in early 1992.

The intervarsities are a standard part of the mathematics scene in the USA and the Soviet Union, and attract a lot of attention in the mathematics community, particularly at the time of the International Olympiads.

The concept is a recent introduction to Ireland and is part of a larger program to build up mathematic in this country. A similar competition has been

organised for leaving certificte students based on their Inter Cert results.

The training problems are to be found each week in the newsgroup called "Ill. studentinfo.superbrain". Last weeks puzzle was an 'alphamtic', a sum where each letter stands for a different digit. Student Killed in Motor Accident

A first year European Studies student was killed in a motor accident at the end of week 3 on Sunday, October 13th. David O'Brien, from Close, Glantworth Co Cork is believed to have died instatntly when his car hit a tree near his home. His body was discovered at the scene of the accident by a passng motorist.

He is survived by his parents, John and Anne, his brother Robert and sisters Catherine, Claire and Jean.

The funeral was held on Tuesday last, October 15th, and was attended by over twenty of the deceased's classmates. Lecturer and Tutorials for 1st Humanities students were canceled on Tuesday as a mark of respect. Postgrads Elect President

Mr Liam Brown, a research student in the Department of Electronic and Computer Engineering was elected President of the Postgraduate students' Association at their AGM held in week 4. He joins the President and Deputy President of the SU as student representative on the University's Academic Council. AT the AGM Mr Brown said the importnt issues for postgraduates were going to arise with the opening of the Foundation Building next year. He is a graduate of the University of Limerick.

PERIPHERAL BUILDINGS PRESENT PROBLEMS

The expansion of the University from one to four buildings spread out across the campus has presented a number of problems for staff and students, it emerged last week.

Many students feel that these 'periphery buildings' are "not up to the standard of the main building, the standards we have come to expect as the norm in the University" It is understood that funds promised to the University by the government earlier in the year may have been affected by the cutbacks announced during the summer. Dr Walsh is known to have held the view that the plant in Thomond would need to be brought 'up to standard' with the meger.

It has been pointed out that the PE Building is without adequate air conditioning, and that the changing rooms are unable to cope with the enlarged student population. The sports office in Student Personnel Services have issued a request to students and staff in an attempt to schedule the use of the visitors changing room.

Another problem has arisen because of the size of the enlarged campus. This has led to an increase in the distance between buildings where classes are held, which involves a lengthy walk.from the PE building to the Schuman building. The Registrar, Mr Leo Colgan, has responded to this problem by issuing a memo to all staff reminding them that lectures hould start on the hour and finish at ten minutes to the hour. However, a number of PE students say that the situation is still impracical. This is timing system does not allow time for students to take a shower at the end of a class and travel the distance involved.

Other problems are associated with the new Schuman building, situated beside the Internatinal Business Centre off the main drive from the main gate to the University. In an artile left into

the Students' Union, one student pointed out the stupidity of scheduling the start of the major drainage works to coincide with term-time, when the work could have been done over the summer. It was also pointed out that the opening hours of the Schuman building are inadequate, especially since the building was intended to accommodate the expansion of the student population at UL. The building is shut at 7.00pm each evening. Although each of the extra students pays fees, the extra money is not being used to provide security so that the study rooms in the new building can

remain open in the evening.

The Schuman building sems to be cut off from the rest of the university in other ways also: there are no public telephones or noticeboards in the building, and student lockers are not vilable in the Schuman building. One student complained "a locker is more than a convenience: it is an intrinsic part of the efficent running of any student's life". He went on to point out that the University's claim that lockers are provided in the main building does not take account of the fact that for some students the schuman building is the focal point of their studies.

A large number of students are angry with




makeup or beauty treatments, Adam no more "Readers Digest" and Kate and Geoff no more wellingtons!

The Campaign Against Blood "Sports"

We are all horrified by acts of violence directed against humans, especially children. Yet if similar acts are perpetrated on animals, what are our attitudes? Statements such as "animals are for man's pleasure" or "animals don't have souls" [note 1] open the door for virtually anything where animals are concerned.

Fortunately there is an increasing realisation that some activities which have been going on for many years, and which have become traditions, are in fact unacceptable. Whaling, the ivory trade, vivisection, bull fighting and blood "sports" are just some examples. Controversy surrounds them all because there are big business interests and in some cases (e.g. vivisection) also complex arguments about benefits to mankind.

Blood "Sports", which are defined as sports in which one animal is set against another, are probably the least acceptable versions of animal abuse since they involve cruelty (it has been described as 'designer cruelty') for fun. A list of blood sports includes many illegal activities such as badger baiting, dog fighting, otter hunting, and the still legal hare coursing and fox hunting.

ALL animal welfare organisations throughout Europe are opposed to coursing and fox hunting. In Ireland it is the **Irish Council Against Blood Sports** (ICABS) which mounts the main campaign against these cruel, legal activities. ICABS aims to change the legal status of blood sports by lobbying

T.D.s and by influencing public opinion. It is a very difficult uphill battle for many reasons:

i)we are a voluntary body with meagre funds and no full-time staff, campaigning against government supported Bord na gCon (responsible for coursing), the Irish Coursing Club (ICC), and very wealthy landowners and hunt clubs. Companies also sponsor coursing and foxhunting. G.P.A., for example, sponsor the 'GPA Country Fair', the main aim of which over the years has been to raise funds for the County Limerick Fox Hunt.

ii)Coursing and fox-hunting have managed to surround themselves with a protective wall made up primarily of the 'tradition' argument - that they are a 'way of life' in the country. The fact that this way of life may be unacceptable is not considered.

Coursing, in particular, thrives on secrecy. It is self governing, self regulated. No cameras are allowed into coursing. R.T.E. is not allowed to film coursing. Even T.D's are refused entry, if they are suspected of being 'anti'.

There is a powerful political lobby from the pro-blood sporters. Coursing supporters are prepared to vote out a T.D. who speaks against blood sports, whereas the vast majority of the population who are opposed to coursing (independent polls show at least 70% against) take a more balanced view, putting education, the economy, etc. first when it comes to an election.

The message for a T.D. is clear: there is nothing to gain politically in speaking against coursing, whatever his moral position may be.

Pro-blood sporters are of course involved in their own campaign, the main aims of this being to stifle public debate and to discredit all 'antis', which presumably means all animal welfare bodies. The pro-blood sports campaigners are very successful. How often have you come across the attitude that those concerned with animal abuse have no interest in human suffering? Or that the 'antis' are somehow involved in illegal activities? This form of innuendo is the pro-blood sports campaign in action.

There is a special language to go with blood sports. The language is intended to convey information to supporters while simultaneously hiding it from 'antis'. An example:-

"the fox was marked to ground and later given best" really means "the fox could run no further, so he found a hole (a drain, or

badger sett, for example) to hide in. The hounds gathered round, indicating his location ['marking him to ground']. Some time later (when the hunt has moved on, so that the riders aren't embarrassed by being forced to witness what really happens) the terrier men move in. They put their terriers down the hole to savage the fox, or dig out the hole to allow the terriers easier access. Eventually (maybe after an hour or two) the terriers will kill the fox ['he was given best']. The terriers themselves often suffer horrific injuries and ironically, terrier men can only be prosecuted if these injuries to their dogs are neglected (which they sometimes are). All hunts have terrier men. Most foxes in Britain and Ireland are killed in this way.

If fox-hunts really wanted to control foxes (and they often claim this is necessary to justify their "sport"), they would use lurchers instead of fox-hounds. A lurcher would catch a fox within 100 yds. and kill it. Of course, there'd be no fun in that; and anyway, if foxes were really controlled, there would be too few to hunt.

I have not had the space to describe coursing or fox-hunting in detail. They are acts of organised, even ritualised, cruelty. They serve no useful purpose, other than to provide entertainment for those who enjoy inflicting cruelty on defenceless creatures.

All violence debases and dehumanises. Young people continually subjected to deliberate violence against animals will have their threshold for violence lowered, making all violence more 'acceptable'.

Academic mismatching. A student I met from the College of Education remarked that Woodwork teachers will not get to "touch timber until third year", now that they are part of the Production Management class.

The impracticalities of bringing teaching practice more in line with the co-op system. Longer "T.P." periods may jeopardize the cooperation of second level schools and the removal of a repeat system is of grave concern to third and fourth years in pursuit of what is now a U.L. degree.

Some positive action has been taken in re-

sponse to student pressure in the last weeks.

College of Education students packed the P.E. lecture hall last Monday to agree on a suggested agenda for the next meeting of the Faculty Board.

We trust that this consultation will have some meaning and that steps will be taken to give students of the College of Education less cause for complaint.





THE 3RD BALL.



Voter Registration

Because of the antiquated voter registration laws in this country, students were virtually dis-enfranchised as they encountered difficulties in travelling to their home constituencies to vote. Following a successful Supreme Court case initiated by Waterford RTC and supported by all the countries third level Student's Union's, this is now not the case. Students who are registered in their home constituency may remain on that voting register while also being included on the register of the constituency in which they reside during the college year, provided they can provide a bona fide address.

The Department of the Environment are now advertising the fact that people must include their names and addresses on the register immediately if they are to be entitled to vote in any election during the forthcoming academic year. Given that students would prove to be a major factor with over 3,000 votes on campus and in the Limerick last constituency (a volatile marginal), may vote here if they wish, of if they encounter difficulties travelling home driving term time (Week 10/11 especially), the Students Union is advising that all students register in this constituency. This is especially pertinent in light of the possibility of an election before the end of the acedemic year. Forms are now available for the S.U. office.

Political Awareness on Campus

Two years ago, Jim Kenny (TD) spoke here at a debate hosted by the Literary and Philosophical Debating Society. At that debate, Major Kemmy lambasted students here in Limerick for their lack of political awareness and their participation in the political process in general in this country. Since then, little has changed. The message, however, must remain the same. Apathy towards politics in Ireland can only be to student disadvantage in a country where politicians in general attempt to keep student issues at arms length. The student body

does not need to be ideologically motivated to be interested in politics. Sponsership of of block voting for particular candidates in elections who display interest in and act upon student issues in those constituencies where students are concentrated ensures that students have a voice in the Dail, Local Authorities etc..

At present, the political parties are represented on campus. Representation by others can only assist students in their quest for representation at a practical national level. Whatever your politics, get involved!!.

The Law

Most of us believe that brushes with the law happen with someone else and not with students. This is not so - there have been cases where the student has been arrested. The aim of this section is to inform you of the your basic rights under the law.

Legal Aid

The Students Union has enlisted the services of a solicitor for the purposes of providing a legal aid service to you, the students. We encourage any student who gets into difficulties with the law to avail of this service which is completely free. Alternately if you just are curious about any aspect of the law, you are perfectly entitled to ask the questions. The solicitor is available during normal working hours by appointment through the Deputy Presidents Office.

Restrictions on Free Legal Aid

- (1) This service cannot be used for the purpose of taking legal action against the Students Union.
- (2) In the event of one student taking legal action against another the solicitor will be available on a first-come, first served basis. There is also a state scheme of civil and legal aid which makes the services of solicitors, and, if necessary barristers available to persons of modest means at little cost. This service includes anything from a solicitors letter to court representation.

Certain types of services are not covered by the scheme, the staff of the law centres will advise you above this and will assist you in filling out a statement of means to determine whether you qualify for legal aid or not. Qualification depends on disposable income, i.e. what is left after certain allowances such as rent etc. This disposable income determines the cost of this service ranging for £1 for advice to £15 for where you have to go to court In cases of extreme hardship it can be free.

The scheme is administered by the Government appointed Legal Aid Board, 46 Upper Mount St., Dublin 2.

The Family Planning Clinic is located on Mallow Street having just passed it's 17,000th client through it's door, I decided to go and see exactly what goes on there.

It consists of two floors, on walking in and calling to the two ladies at the desk. I was immediately struck by the informality and friendlyness of it all. The shelves are covered with pamplets from contraception to marriage problems to books on puperty and growing up. The pamplets on contraception outline the advantages and disadvantages of each, it's risks and benefits in a clear and concise manner. Free advice is given over the counter, condoms can be purchased or you can make an appointment with the nurse or doctor (both being female). An appointment involves being interviewed by the nurse, who fills out a chart relating to your general health, she checks your blood pressure and weight. Then you go and see the doctor, she provides a greater range of services than prescribing contraception, including smeer tests and breast examinations. It costs £12 for an appointment. Times have moved greatly in the last fifteen years, from the stage that the clinic was illegal, but still today there seems to exist a stigma around having or taking precautions. As I talked to the nurse and doctor I realised that there seems to be a general ignorance about how someone knows if they are pregnant or not. There is also concern about the alarming amount who do get pregnant each year and this could be related to the differences in sex education in secondary schools. As I sat there and watched the constant flow of people in and out, I realised this was just another service that everyone may need at sometime, even just to clear up some questions. And it's pratical people who take steps to avoid unwanted pregnency and/or disease, something none of us should be afraid to do.

The Lit and Phil Society were the sobbing witnesses on Wed of Week 2, to the heartwrenching finale of the Waide era, when at the end of the evening, he solmenly handed over the much prized maroon and yellow cloak symbol of all that is just in the Soc. Auditor no more - Mr. Waide was in a state of downtrodden desolation for at least five minutes. Then the 'experienced' (in what way?) Mr. Neville Bourke donned the aforementioned mantle of distinction.





Studs is the story of a disheartened & dejected football team. They are at the bottom of the league and frankly, sick of being thrashed week after week. Their itinery does not include trophies, fans, subs or even a manager. When we meet them they are about to lose their football ground. The players spend more time fighting among themselves than playing football. There is little hope left until a stranger appears, a man determined to make something out of this ragged bunch of misfits.

Studs was written by Paul Mercier & was first produced by Passion Machine in April 1986, in the SFX

centre, Dublin. You need to be a little patient with the early parts of Studs as it developes slowly at first, not gaining momentum until about an hour into the performance. When it does take off, it really gets going, and the second half is really outstanding. This excellent play is the story of eleven men presented to us as realistically as possible. The language may be a little strong at times, but it's a great tale and certainly one worth seeing.

Great Mambo Chicken & The Transhuman Condition

Buy this! Skip a lecture tomorrow, run into town and BUY THIS BOOK! In it, the greatest ideas ever known to man share a brain with academic stupidity and insanity. Ed Regis has catalogued the history of fin-de-siecle scientific hubris.

It's the story of the decay of science, the perversion of thought and the whisper of hope for tomorrow. 30 years ago they said man would never walk on the moon, now Regis proclaims immortality, travel to another galaxy & building an organism from scratch. This book is not "Specialist Interest", it's the story of thought in the world of science. Stuff you'd never see on Tomorows World.

Regis begins his account with the gruesome story of Dora Kent, the original woman who wanted to live forever. Her son Saul invented cryonics (Freezing dead bodies and restoring them when they find a cure for your last illness). Saul invented this process in 1968, Dora died in 1968, Saul was arrested for murder in 1968. Fascinating. Sadly for Dora, Saul finds it difficult to conduct experiments from his cell, so she may well be on ice forever.

Another side of Ed's immortality epistle asks if we are only what we remember? If we are, then a computer with intelligence and independent memory may well be a person. If it knows the pleasure of sex, beethoven and walnut whips then does it truly know pleasure? The independent non-biological life-style is discussed at length. Crazy.

Regis concerns himself with the hopes and aspirations that have faded. He searches through the ashes of science to analyse the sparks that remain. The fire that flamed when fanned with interest but burnt out when forgotten. Regis adores the garage scientist. the half-baked one man show of head-freezers, robot-lovers & space colonisers. He celebrates the gleeful mockery misjudged in the technological accelleration. The great mambo chicken of the title refers to a flock of chickens that were kept in a centerfuge at 2.5 g and



when they emerged they were "paragons of great strength and endurance."

This whole book is strangely stirring. It'll make you want to transfer to Engineering, and if any book makes you do that it's a bible. Read this.

Jimmy manages the commitments, a band from made up of his old school friends. It also includes an older man named Joey that is auditioned in Jimmys back-yard.


The film is witty and serious and some of the elder lemons might find the language offensive, but it portrays the reality of everyday life.




