ITD has created a WWW (World Wide Web) interface into the Student Record Administrative System (SRAS) for students to interrogate their transcripts. For security reasons, this service will initially be only available within the University (i.e. on

can interrogate their transcript of their convenience.

Details on how to connect to this service will be on the notice boards in all ITD computer labs on February 17, the first day of the Spring Semester. Student Services will also post out details of this service along with next semester's timetable on February 7. The Corporate Systems support group of ITD will be working closely with Student

Registration, correspondence requests etc. This will provide a better quality service to students, increasing access to services and decreasing the necessity of queuing.

Canor Cronin, C.E.O in the Students' Union welcomed this development and congratulated George Hayes, Eamonn Fitzgerald, Martin Leonard and their colleagues in Corporate Systems for their initiative in bringing this to the students.

## "I" GRADES

**I Grades** shall only be awarded where a student:

- has submitted certifiable evidence of medical and/or psychological illness or immediate family bereavement.

### Certification:

- is only valid when it comes via University Health Services / Chaplaincy.
- where a certificate originates outside the University, the student is required to submit the certifi-

cate to the University Health Services Office within five working days of the relevant end of semester examinations.

- Properly completed certificates must be dated and include period of illness / incapacity and the nature of the illness.
- Certification on the ground of family bereavement must come via the Chaplaincy / Health Services and be forwarded to the Student Services Officer

within five working days of the relevant end of semester exams.

**ALL I GRADES MUST BE CLEARED NO LATER THAN ANNUAL SPECIAL REPEAT PERIOD FOLLOWING THE AWARD OF I GRADE.**

i.e. you cannot progress to the following year if you have an I grade outstanding.

All I Grades will be processed following the annual repeats.

What is the National Alcohol Policy Document about?

MN

Well, I think we are only the second country in Europe that has such a Policy. It addresses all the difficulties that people have with alcohol and like yourselves at your awareness week it provides moderate drinking rather than abstinence. Alcohol is a good thing if used in moderation but lots of people use the drink badly and when it is used to excess it is seriously damaging someone's health.

So can you tell me what the Policy Document's aims and goals are?

To make people conscious of the relationship between alcohol and ill health, and then to encourage people that if they are drinking to drink more moderately and to be aware of the fact that alcohol can damage one's heart. Certain cancer is related to alcohol, but what astounds a lot of people is the statistics that out of 25,000 persons in our psychiatric hospitals in any one year about 3,500 of them are there as a result of over use of alcohol.

Do you think that certain sections of this Document are applicable to students themselves?

Yes, they are. I think that the general message is very important but as well as that we did a survey of the 18-25 year olds and they tended to drink on a regular basis. A college student drank more than young people at work. Also we found out that mixing alcoholic drinks, which is a very bad practice, was a common practice among college students and some engaged in the

practice of mixing drinks deliberately intending to become drunk quickly. So it is quite clear that among some young people there is excessive drinking and some young people are showing signs of early alcoholism already. I would laud what you are doing and encourage you to continue because moderate drinking can be very pleasant and enjoyable and sociable but excessive drinking causes all sorts of health difficulties.

To those students who drink in excess what would you see as the dangers and health risks of alcohol to them?

Various depressions and psychiatric problems first of all. Secondly then as they move through their 20's they would become dependant on the drug which is alcohol and they would become alcoholics and have to have intensive treatment before they could quit the habit. As well as that of course, it makes a very large whole in your pocket. In later life people who drink to excess right through their lives are risking a whole lot of illnesses which persons who drink moderately or do not drink at all are not risking.

So finally Minister do you think the idea of an Alcohol Awareness Week is an idea that could be practised by other third level institutions in Ireland?

Yes, I think is a very good idea because it is difficult enough at a National level or a Health Board level to get the attention of young people in colleges but I think that college students themselves through Students Unions will get the kind of attention that is necessary and young people are likely to listen to their peers than anybody else.
