



It is with great distress and anxiety that I write this letter to all the students of the University of Limerick. Most of you will know that for the past three months certain individuals interested in the professionalisation and development of clubs and societies and indeed the University as a whole, were struck a heavy and devastating blow at the recent Students' Union EGM on Tuesday last, 18 March. The meeting was called in order to radically alter the ULSU Constitution so as to give clubs and societies the right to determine their own policies. This meeting failed to reach the necessary quorum of two hundred people. Why? Because students of the University of Limerick don't care! Last Tuesday would have been the beginning of a new era in the history of our Union. It would have been the necessary catalyst which could have brought that air of professionalism that is so needed in the structures of this University. But it didn't happen. The chance missed, I have a message for all clubs and societies on this campus. Thanks to you, and your empty promises of support, future students have lost their right to a properly run clubs and societies structure. Those who view this

current generation will laugh and scoff because students of this University and especially those students who are member of a club or society failed in their duty and right to discuss issues which affect them. People will not forget this. Those people who proposed these changes, including myself, will not forget it and probably more seriously the people holding the pursa strings will not forget it. Members of the Law Society, the GAA and the rest of those clubs and societies who shamed us a have a lot of questions to answer by their non-attendance Those astute clubs and societies who did attend, I thank, but ask why not more? I only hope that the long road of reform has not ended here, defeated and subjugated. I pray to see one day a more professional and efficient body of students, willing to work and strive to make this University a proud place in which to study and enjoy ourselves. My final word goes to the brave people who formulated and campaigned for constitutional change - Ron Byrne, Garvan Barry, Paul Lee and Muirs O'Sullivan. The fight has not ended. It goes on. Class Representatives Council Update, by Aiden O'Gorman

The class Reps council meets every second week in S205 at 6pm. All are welcome to attend and it is important that each class ensures that they are represented at these meetings. Because week 8 is Kolledge week it was decided to postpone the next meeting until Wednesday of week 9. The following is a report of the meeting that took place on Tuesday of week 6

Geraldine Moloney from the Library kindly agreed to attend the Class Rep's meeting in order to answer questions about the service that the library is offering to students here on campus. Issues raised included library opening times, lack of availability of some needed books and copies of FYP's. The problem of people using mobile phones disrupting other students in the Library was also discussed..

Geraldine promised to return when she had replies for all queries put to her by the various Class Rep's.

At the last meeting a petition was handed out by a representative of the Environmental society to ask for a Pedestrian crossing from Plassey Village to the Main entrance. As only one Class Rep had returned with the petition it was decided that petitions could be handed in to the Students' Union office. All Class Reps could make an effort to get the petitions filled out by their classes and to return them quickly.

Ron Byme gave an outline of some proposals to highlight the Irish Language on Campus.

Some of his ideas included an Irish language page in an Focal, Irish signs be placed around the University. That the SU home page on the Web be in Both Irish and English and possibly that the new Cafe/Bar be given an Irish name. It was decided that a sub-committee be set up to further develop these ideas.

Denis Duggan gave a proposal to allow multiple Polling Booths in the different buildings on campus for future Students' Union elections. These included hosting such elections on the web or the possibility of using networked computers to set up a database to record the place where each student cast his/her vote. This would prevent people voting more that once in different places. However students would still use the Traditional Ballot paper method to cast their votes. The benefits of the proposed changes are that it would make it easier for student who do not usually attend classes in the main building cast their votes. If web voting was introduced it would allow people on Co-Op or Erasmus to vote. A lively debate ensued on this issue in which it was stated that a awareness campaign would have to be organised in order to combat fear of new procedures. It was also pointed out that such changes would have to be rigorously tested before being implemented on something as important as the Sabbatical elections. The proposed changes were to be presented at the next meeting of the Students Union Executive.

(At the Exec meeting on Wednesday it was decided that allowing distributed polling booths using electronic means was a laudable idea and a system should be developed and extensively tested. It was decided that as the Sabbatical elections were too close, that it would be unfeasible to have these mechanisms in place this year but hopefully they could be developed and be ready for next years Executive and Class Rep's elections.) Barry gave a speech outlining the roll of the Class Rep's as a body that decided policies within the Students' Union.

Tara Mc Cabe told us of her plans for a sexual awareness campaign and also of the latest developments in the Limerick Education Inniatative and Outreach Programs.



Finally it was decided that the next meeting be held on Wednesday of week 9 as week 8 is Kolledge week. All Classes should ensure that they are represented.




There's been loads happening on the Wired FM front over the last few weeks, and this is just a report to let you all know about it.

First of all, lots of you mightn't know a whole lot about Wired FM, the main reason for that being that it was very hard to pick up the signal out here. It's been explained in letters from station managers and chair people on the board before, but the problem was really that the transmitter wasn't placed high enough, and because of the position of the campus, being low down, the signal couldn't reach us. Anyway, representatives from the IRTC were down a couple of weeks ago, and we've received a report from them as to how we can fix it. Previously we'd thought that we'd have to put up a new transmitter, i.e. planning permission, loads of money, and therefor loads of time. The target for good transmission was set for next September. The good news is that the IRTC have told us that this isn't necessary, and have proposed that we use a temporary transmitter for the time being. This is being organised and I've been told that we will have a much better signal by rag week. The IRTC are also working on a long term solution with the station management. So basically, there's been a lot of progress, and the problem is temporarily solved with a permanent solution not too far away. Thanks to Rosemary Day, who promised action on the situation at a general meeting of the ULSU, has brought it to this stage of improvement, and is still working hard on it.

The main thing that's happened other than that is the resignation of the station manager Eoin Brady, who has landed a job as a producer at RTE's new arts and classical music station, Lyric FM, so congratulations to him. Interviews for the position of station manager, which was advertised nationally, were held last week, and the new manager, Darren Connolly, starts on Monday. While we've been managerless though, all the work has been left to the three co-op managers, Deirdre in UL, Suzanne in LIT, and Katharina in Mary I., so thanks to them as well.

Another retirement was that of Dr. John Hayes, the first chairperson of Wired, and the man who got the whole show on the road. It's because of his work that we all have the


