UL athletics club have had quite the year, from gold at the world student games last summer to two athletes competing at this summers' Olympics #rio2016. Thomas Barr and Michelle Finn can be seen here in the 400m Hurdles and the 3000m Steeplechase respectively (2 pics on Extreme right). Our next step is resurfacing the track which we hope to see happening in the coming year through UL Sport & the Buildings & Estates Dept. The distance athletes will be the first to compete in the road relays and cross country events over the first semester. The girls took centre stage last year, with a 2nd place finish in the national road relay championships and wins in the Munster and national cross-country championships. Amy O'Donoghue (Bottom Row 2nd pic from left) and Michelle (1st Picture on left – top row) were both part of these teams. This is the first time UL have won the cross country since 2001. Well done girls! The indoor season begins the second week back after Christmas, so make sure you keep up your training over the Christmas holidays if you want to be in with a shout for a medal. Last year both the men and women were 2nd overall in the indoor. We had many wins and record breaking performances that day! Jenna Bromell, Michelle, Alana Frattaroli, James Ledingham and Thomas all set UL records in their chosen events, and the men's 4x200m relay of Eanna Madden, Paul Byrne, Kieran Elliot and Thomas also broke the record. It was just a taste of what was to come for the outdoors. We also brought a small team of 12 athletes to the US to compete against Harvard in the Beantown Challenge, (Top right of cover Back Row L-R: Róisín Howard, Alana, Kevin Chesser, PJ Galvin, Shane Howard, Sorcha Murphy, Jenna & Grace Lynch; Front Row L-R: Eanna, Paul White, Rory Chesser, Kathy O'Keeffe, James & Eoin Walsh). We also visited the Yale campus while we were there.

The outdoors was held in Dublin last year and UL achieved 2nd place overall, but again with had many wins and records were broken again. Shane, Laura Kavanagh and Simon Ziegler are pictured in some of the jump disciplines at these championships. Some of our throwers are also shown here: Simon, Alana, Róisín, Seamus McMahon and Killian Barry. Killian, Simon and Michelle all set UL records in their chosen events at these championships. Athletes were picked from these championships to compete in Scotland for the Irish Universities team, many of whom were UL athletes but due to other commitments only Shane and Alana could compete. The Irish team won this event.

Outside of college athletics we had a great summer. We had athletes picked for the European Championships, the World Juniors and the Olym-

pics. Eanna and Thomas competed in the 4x100m and 4x400m relays respectively, Niamh and Jenna were in the 4x100m and 4x400m relays respectively, Paul Byrne and Thomas Barr contented in the 400m Hurdles, Michelle Finn in the Steeplechase and Eoin Everard in the 1500m at the Europeans. Jenna Bromell also competed in the 400m at the World Juniors. The most outstanding performance was that of Thomas Barr, breaking the 48 second barrier to break the Irish record for a 2nd time that week and place an amazing 4th place finish in the Olympic Games!! Well done Thomas from all at UL! The UL campus community really came out in droves to support Thomas. I think Jessie Barr's dog got the most attention before the race! It was great to see two UL athletes on the big screen, Thomas competing and Jessie making her RTE debut. Here's to another successful year at UL Sport!

We would like to extend a warm invitation to all of you to come to our annual Clubs & Societies Recruitment Drive in the UL Arena, Wednesday the 7th of September from 4pm-7.30pm

Welcome back to all our members from last year!

It has been a busy summer in your absence and since the monumental decisions last April to approve more than €20+ Million worth of Building projects with a student levy, the discussions and meetings have been going on behind the scenes, between the University and the Students Union. First of all Hugh Kelly the architect with whom many of you had an opportunity to interact with through Clubs & Societies Council etc., as the person responsible for developing the concept for the New Student Centre was asked to carry out another piece of work, post the referendum by the University. Basically he was asked to present the various options for the most suitable location from the geographical area designated for this project. It has since been identified that the most suitable and most advantageous site for a new state of the Art Student Centre will be adjoining the current student centre in the area of the current visitor car park adjacent to the new Library extension. There is a whole process of documentation preparation that goes to prepare for what is referred to as "Frameworks" and the E-tender process. That is where we are at present moment in time with applications from civil & electrical engineers coming in, architects, project managers, contractors etc. When that is completed there will possibly be as many as 60+ different applications to be examined and filtered at which point there is a criteria based scoring mechanism, follow up checks for additional paperwork such as financial status amongst other more technical reviews. Once this is completed we then enter into a shortlist of the best applicants and interviews begin to appoint all the aforementioned. At that point once contracts are awarded and signed off – the likes of the New Student Centre, New floodlit synthetic pitches, new climbing wall, handball alleys all kick off for real. The 25M pool is nearly there and set to open hopefully in January 2017 and the refurb of the second floor of the Arena will also begin with a dedicated Martial Arts rooms, Dance studio all of which the students of UL are contributing to.

I think it's fair to say to those first years landing you may well be a part of all of these projects before your 4 years are complete in the University of Limerick. The student centre will be the project that takes the longest and with a 3.5 year average timeline for completion it would be just amazing to experience in your 4th year

This is the beauty of a student's union and all it individual parts from Clubs & Societies to Entertainments, Students Council, Class Reps, full time staff and the various executive and AGM's – that when the members buy in and engage we have a very real and formidable part to play in shaping this University – we can only ever be as good as our members allow us to be – that is the strength and support in numbers and the whole philosophy of the Wolf Pack.



The UL Vikings

The American Football Club in UL is coming off their most successful season in terms of club development. Another top four finish Irish American the Football Shamrock Bowl division coincided with our second international tour. intervarsity champions and our heavy involvement in the newly revived national

The Vikings enjoyed one of our more successful seasons in recent years. Having been beaten in the semi-finals by the Dublin Rebels, the 2016 Champions, it proved to be an unfitting end to an incredible regular season. UL began their season winning their first five games from five, including highlight of the entire Irish season by beating the reigning four in a row champions, the Belfast Trojans. It was the Trojans first visit to Limerick and it ended in their first defeat in over two years. The following game resulted something relatively unheard of in American football, a draw. UCD and UL battled through a heavy south Dublin sun to grind out a draw in what was one of the most bruising games of the season, ending with a UCD missed field-goal to end 10-10. A defeat at the hands of the Dublin Rebels in Santry sent the Vikings to the quarter finals to overcome a valiant Trinity College side 7-6, setting up a replay to the Rebels again in Santry. It wasn't to be the Viking's year, falling again to the Rebels on their home

Prior to the regular season, the Vikings encountered their first taste of gold of the year, overcoming Trinity College in the intervarsity semi-final in November and continuing on to defeat UCD in overtime to claim their first intervarsity title since 2012. Intervarsity's as always proved to be a fantastic opportunity for young rookies to prove themselves with over 30 lining out for us on the day, our largest ever rookie class.

Rookies were encouraged to prove themselves as genuine football players when 42 players, coaches and staff travelled to **Barcelona** to take on the Barcelona Buffals in our second friendly international. Our rookies fought valiantly against one of Spain's best teams and were unfortunate not to come away with a victory losing out by just one score. The hard work on many of this team did not go unnoticed. A rejuvenation of the Irish senior team has led to thirteen of the Vikings travelling to Holland on August 27th to take on the Dutch Lions in Ireland's first international test in American Football. This comes at the end of an extensive two year programme run by the IAFL. A similar programme for Under 20's is entering its second year and hopes to see similar results.

Get Your Year Off to a Flying Start!

To all new students at UL, the archery club says hello and invites you to embrace your inner Katniss or Robin Hood in our fun and friendly training sessions at the archery club! No experience is needed and all you need to bring is yourself and we will supply you with all the equipment and with our 6 week beginner course you will soon be an expert (If you want to bring along some sweets though we won't complain, we like to share sweets around trainingJ).

So what do we do? We train new members up to competition standard. There are also Intervarsity's with other colleges around Ireland throughout the year. We also run table guizzes and club nights out ranging from bowling to mid-winter barbecues.

Intervarsity's are archery competitions that run between the colleges of Ireland. Each competitor is given a target number and letter. Each target board has four competitors from a range of different colleges around Ireland so you get plenty of chances to meet new people. There are two shoot groups, an early one and a late one. Each competitor shoots 30 arrows. After the alternate group has shot, the 1st group returns to shoot a further 30 arrows resulting in a total of 60 arrows shot per archer, with a maximum score of 600 points. Scoring is done by another archer who is also shooting on your board but they must also be a student from a different college. Don't worry about your skill level in these competitions as you will be grouped with archers at a similar level of experience these are into beginner, intermediate and advanced. Each of these categories have a different sized target face, 60cm for beginners, 40cm for intermediate and advanced category can shoot at either a 40cm or 3 spot target face. The categories are further split into male and female as well as bow type, either bare bow like Katniss, Olympic recurve or compound like Green Arrow.

Last year saw UL club receive success in several of the intervarsity's that were held over the course of the year. Our most successful archer was Sean Flavin who graduated last year and had taken up archery who starting college four years earlier, he came 1st in 4 out of the 6 intervarsity's held in the 2015/2016 season in the guest recurve category. Our newest members who joined archery last year with no experience of archery also did very well in competitions, with Devon Long coming 2nd in the recurve beginner category in the 1st intervarsity of the year and then went on to come 2nd in the compound bow category at the Student Nationals. Another of our Archers Lora Ciesa also did very well coming in 2nd at the final intervarsity of the year held at NUIG. Plenty of our new archers also earned their white badge for shooting over 400 out of 600 points at a intervarsity including Devon Long, Lora Ciesa, Conor O'Brien, Darragh Kelleher to name but a few. We hope to build on our success from last year with many of our archers training hard over the summer to get ready for

this season. The attached

photo is of our very own Devon Long at the Student Nationals in UCC.

We have a cracking time at training sessions as well with in-club competitions to practice scoring and to introduce a little friendly competition. We also have prizes for our winners! In the past, we have themed nights as well like Halloween where you can shoot zombies (don't worry they are paper zombies not real zombies), as well as regular balloon shooting competitions.

So if all those activities haven't inspired you to come, I don't know what will! We're a great bunch and are always welcoming new members in. We have training sessions for new members on Wednesdays at either 7:30pm-8:30pm, 8:30pm-9:30pm or 9:30pm-10:30pm and hope to see you there.

UL FemSoc – Reclaiming Feminism & A New, Positive Image

It was hard to believe that in just a few short weeks we had come so far. As I sat in the crowded Pavilion and listened to the speeches of various guest politicians, surrounded by an enthusiastic audience, I was struck with the realisation that our newly-founded Feminist Society had finally made it. After countless meetings, endless discussions and stacks of paperwork, all of our hard work had culminated in forming a new society that was well on its way to success.

As 2015 began to draw to a close and the UL campus buzzed with Christmas excitement and exam stress, a small group of students crowded around a table to discuss the possibility of establishing a new society at the University of Limerick. Students ranging from first years to postgraduates from various fields of study all shared their ideas for creating a new, inclusive feminist space at the university, and it was incredible to see such passion and enthusiasm among such a diverse group. During our numerous meetings and discussions we shared our ideas of how to establish a space in which issues related to gender could be discussed openly, and how we could reclaim feminism for ourselves.

Over the years, the word "feminism" seems to

have lost its true meaning in mainstream media and has become wrongly synonymous with aggression and hatred, a term repeatedly rejected for its perceived negative connotations. Contrary to popular belief, however, feminism is not about hatred, domination or aggression. It is not a term to be feared, nor is it something we should be reluctant to associate ourselves with. Modern feminism focuses on inclusivity, acceptance and engaging in dialogue to break down issues relating to gender. An example of such is the difficulty women often face in the political sphere and is an issue which inspired our "Women in Politics"

event in April of 2016.

As our first high-profile event as a budding society, this evening of discussion gave us the incredible opportunity to listen to the stories of Irish politicians Avril Cronin of Fine Gael, Lorna Bogue of the Green Party and Sarah Jane Hennelly of the Social Democrats and to hear how their gender has affected their political careers. As women, they felt that they faced challenges their male counterparts do not as they struggled to be taken seriously as political figures. They described the difficulty to have their voiced heard in discussions and felt as though the male-dominated world of politics was unwelcoming to female representatives. Despite these difficulties, they gave a fascinating insight into the advantages of being a female politician, such as perhaps having more empathy and being able to offer a new perspective on political issues. It was a truly enlightening event that not only highlighted the issues that women face in the political realm, but was also incredibly inspiring as an example of feminism working in everyday life. I was amazed at the outpouring of support and positivity, not only from our members but from the politicians themselves. For us, their presence was a confirmation of the legitimacy of our new little society and inspired us to try to continue

Moving into the new academic semester of 2016 as Co-President of this society, I am aware that continuing the success of last semester will not be

an easy task. Creating society from nothing and developing into something which people enjoy and are proud of is a feat in and of itself, but with the



added difficulty of the widespread scepticism regarding feminism our task is that much more difficult.
