Projects - the Maguire's Sports Pitches has finally come on line

Many of you will have noticed last semester, the huge floodlights erected at the back of the sports playing fields close to the UL Arena that is the area known as "Maguire's". For those who may not be aware this is a brand new sporting facility specifically for the development of student sports and the general fitness and fun of the whole student body. It will of

course benefit other groups out of term time and the wider c o m m u n i t y once UL Sport actively manage and promote the facility during 2019.

There are

three full size-playing pitches, equivalent in size to a GAA pitch (GAA being the largest sports field dimension). One of these will be a natural grass surface (not yet available until summer 2019) with the other two being synthetic grass pitches, complete with three Hurling "ball walls". The plans also include a walking/jogging area around the perimeter of all three pitches, which is almost fully complete, referenced as the "Golden Mile" by our Director of Sport, Mr. David Mahedy. An excellent opportunity for the student body to recreate and socialise while out walking and exercising in a well-lit and safe environment

It was an eventful and busy semester for the UL Wolves Handball club. It started in the sweltering climate of Minneapolis, Minnesota in August and ended in the cold alley of Broadford, Co. Limerick with several stops in between. Competitions ranged from club run tournaments to Irish Intervarsities to All Ireland Championships to the World Handball Championships. Players got the chance to travel to Wexford, Galway, Belfast, Limerick, Tipperary, and USA throughout these series of tournaments. It was the busiest semester since the foundation of the club and one of the most successful with nine World medals proving to be the highlight of our activities.

The first two Irish Intervarsities took place in Wexford and Galway with UL sending the largest number of players to both tournaments from the competing colleges. They returned with numerous sore and aching limbs following a series of intense and closely fought battles but also had several fond memories from the social aspects of the weekend also. The club returned with nine medals from the Intervarsities also to further fill the bulging coffers at home and maintain their incredible recent success.

The second biggest tournament on Irish soil took place in Belfast in November with the Golden Gloves tournament hosting 20 UL players. The tournament afforded the players opportunity to explore the city and they enjoyed the opportunity to experience some of the country's culture whiles competing against the best handballers in Ireland. Colin Corbett battled through the packed A grade to claim the title and bring home one of the most prestigious titles in Irish handball.

The club also travelled to Salthill, Moycullen, Cashel, Thurles, and Broadford (three times) for club run tournaments to hone their skills and enjoy a series of social activities to develop the bond between the players.

This semester kicks off with the biggest Intervarsity on the calendar in Belfast, Antrim. This kicks off a whistle stop tour around Ireland, Europe and Northern America for the club. Sicily, Minneapolis, Dublin, Cork, Inis Mór, Mayo, Roscommon, Galway, Tyrone, and Kerry are all included in the clubs trips for this semester.

The club will also have a series of social outings and fundraising events in the semester. We welcome all levels of ability from beginners to senior players. This meeting was in the presence of a trained ADAPT employee who was there to answer any questions anyone may have had before, during or after the meeting. Kate McGrew, a sex worker and well-known for her work on trying to provide rights for sex workers spoke with the society, as well as Matt Kennedy, a trans inclusive poet and activist about trans-inclusivity in feminism.

The society collaborated with the Islamic Society to raise awareness around direct provision, and we held a stall at the court-yard where Islamic Society kindly showed us some of their native sweet recipes for people to come and try out, while talking about direct provision and what it meant. We also had a guest speaker from Doras Luimni who spoke about direct provision and the current situation in Limerick and what people can do to help raise awareness and improve the system. We also held a successful panel discussion called 'Conversations about Consent' with guest speakers from GOSHH, Adapt Service Limerick and Rape Crisis Mid-West to raise awareness about sexual consent.

Some of the topics we will be covering in the upcoming semester will be self-defense, which we continue to work on since the first semester, and we hope to provide a safe environment for females to learn basic self-defense at their own pace. We will be looking at the Cervical Check scandal and how it has impacted women in Ireland, particularly here in Limerick, and the raising awareness on campus about the importance of both males and females availing of the HPV vaccine, if they haven't done so already. We also plan to order hoodies for our members, having already started to take orders via our Facebook page, so if

With the bit between our teeth and backed by Horse Racing Ireland, our group has grown in size with each semester and we have enjoyed some terrific times together in recent years.

In our first year we managed to

visit champion jumps trainer Willie Mullins' Closutton base, Joseph O'Brien's burgeoning Owning Hill operation and the incredible Coolmore Stud as well as Aidan O'Brien's Ballydoyle.

It was an excellent start to the last academic semester when we were treated to an access all areas tour of Gordon Elliott's impressive Cullentra House Stables, getting a taste for some of the outstanding talent in the County Meath stables before the season really developed.

The Gold Cup and Grand National-winning trainer was extremely generous with his time and gave us the opportunity to get up close to the likes of his star performers Samcro, Apple's Jade, Tiger Roll and Shattered Love, followed by racing at Fairyhouse Racecourse courtesy of Horse Racing Ireland from a private suite.

One of the highlights of our last academic year was our first trip abroad to visit British Champions Day at Ascot in London, which certainly lived up to expectations. We enjoyed world class racing in the afternoon at the phenomenal racecourse before a post-racing concert on track with George Ezra and racing the following morning at Kempton Park.

Much of our second semester focussed around running a Cheltenham Festival preview night in the Castletroy Park Hotel with the proceeds going to Limerick Suicide Watch, and we were extremely disappointed to have to cancel the event at the last minute due to the 'Beast From The East' making it impossible for our star panel to travel.

However, we were still able to hand over a cheque for €620 in March to the brilliant charity as the majority of our advance sales chose to not ask for a refund and for the money to go to Limerick Suicide Watch.

As well as running a social evening in Limerick for our Christmas racing knowledge quiz, we also headed to day one of the Punchestown Festival and had our own private box overlooking the winning post for the afternoon, which was a nice addition after a guided tour of the Irish National Stud earlier that morning.

In the first semester of 2018/19 we joined forces with Go Racing's MyRacing 25 Club and were central to the launch of this new initiative which discounts racing tickets and hosts exclusive tours of racing stables and stallion farms for its members.

This saw us visit the home of Alpha Centauri at Jessica Harrington's Commonstown Stables where the leading trainer invited us into her kitchen for a morning coffee (with the Cheltenham Gold Cup on show for all to see!) before heading up the gallops for the horses' exercise work. The likes of Sizing John and Supasundae were among the stars on display in Moone, County Kildare.

We also were provided with a tour of Godolphin's outstanding Kildangan Stud, seeing world class stallions and incredible facilities which allows the Ruler of Dubai Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum's equine talent to flourish. From a social perspective, our night at the dogs, when we had a race named after our society, was a highly enjoyable evening.

This semester we will be engaging in further events with Horse Racing Ireland but the highpoint of the semester should hopefully be a trip to the Aintree Grand National in April, with the committee working hard on this project at the time of writing.
