Historic Weekend for Rowing Club at National Championships



On an overcast weekend in July, months of training are put to the test as the Irish National Rowing Championships commence in Iniscara, Co. Cork. In less than seven minutes, down a six-lane, two thousand metre course is the one shot the University of Limerick Rowing Club has to fight for a chance for the All-Ireland Rowing Champs pot. For the rowers of ULRC, the countless hours on the rowing machines, 7 AM training times and the blistered hands from the innumerable time on the water culminate in this Championships weekend as their shot at glory in the Intermediate and Senior events. This marks the first year of ULRC under new Head Coach James Mangan and ULRC has their sights set high. ULRC has only won a Championships title once outside of the novice grade, with Cathal Moynihan (ML4- Beijing '08) and Paddy Quinn in the Inter 2- in 2005, but both squads this year are looking to change this.

This Championship, encompassing 4s and 8s, sees a University of Limerick Rowing Club entry across much of the categories, with ULRC fielding boats in Men's Inter 4+, Inter 8+, Senior 8+ and Women's Inter 4+, and a UL rower in a composite Women's senior 4- and Women's Senior 8+. The Men's squad is comprised of Andrew Hurley (Sports Science '10), James Brinn, Liam Rice (Mech. Eng. '11), Stephen Penny (Sports Science '12), David Meehan,

Brian O'Connor (UL Alumni), Conor Doorley (Sports Science '13), Paul Noonan (Comp. Eng. '10) and Damien Penkert (UL Alumni). The Women's squad is comprised of Rachel Meehan (UL Alumni), Emma Ryan (UL Alumni), Alice O'Sullivan (UL Alumni), Liz Gabbett (UL Alumni) and Laura Purdy (Lecturer at UL).

The first event of the Championships ULRC participated in was the Men's Inter 8+ early Friday afternoon. A straight final, ULRC was up against the formidable opponents Galway RC, Carlow, UCD, Trinity and Neptune. Even with the blustery conditions, UL was able to take an early lead and extended it further and further through out the race. They won by more than a length to Galway RC in this exciting race. This was an especially sweet victory for the squad, with this being five out of the nine's first ever win at the National Championships. The afternoon saw the heats and final of the Women's senior 4-, in which ULRC was represented by UL Alumni, Alice O'Sullivan. This composite boat of St Michaels RC, Killorglin RC and ULRC came fourth in the final, with Skibbereen taking the win. The Saturday of the Champs was the big day for the club, competing in four events. First, the heats of the Men's Inter 4+, comprised of Andrew Hurley, Liam Rice, Stephen Penny, James Brinn and Damien Penkert, with the first three, all UL students,

also representing Ireland at next week's Home International Regatta, taking place in Cork. This was followed swiftly by the heats of the Women's Inter 4+. Both crews gave it their all, but only the men advanced to the early afternoon finals. ULRC dominated the final of Men's Inter 4+, winning by over two lengths to Galway RC. Coming into the late afternoon, two of the biggest events in Irish rowing, the men's and women's Senior 8s, both featured ULRC representation. The Men's Squad put forth a Senior 8, comprised of the same crew as the Inter 8 and the Women's squad had Alice O'Sullivan competing in a senior composite boat. Unfortunately, a mix up with the men's Senior 8's Cox meant that they could not race. The crew was looking forward to see how they would match up with the senior crews, but they were not too disappointed because they had won both of the races they had looked to win. The Women's Senior 8 was a straight final, with the composite 8 coming in first easily. This is a big win for the club and especially Alice O'Sullivan, with this being only her third year rowing.

University of Limerick Rowing Club went into the weekend with hopes of winning a National Championship and came away with three illustrious wins. Undoubtedly one of the most successful years of the club, it has paved the way for more successful years to come. Under the tutelage of Head Coach James Mangan, the crew's hard work paid off tenfold and will hopefully set an example for crews for years to come. This work will be put to the test in two months time when the squad will be racing again in small boats in the September Championships. Well done to ULRC and to all those involved.

UL BroCon 2010

UL BroCon is UL's first games, anime and manga convention. The first BroCon was held between the 16th and 18th of July 2010 and attracted over 200 visitors from all over the country.

Organised jointly by the UL Games Society and the Anime & Manga Society, BroCon took a year to plan and organise and emerged a massive success for both societies. It helped establish us as an active gaming, anime and manga community and connect us to others around the country. The convention was also a great way of showing off the university to people from all over the country. Visitors and guest staff could not fail to be impressed by our attractive, modern and spacious campus, and everyone agreed that the EGO rooms were well-suited to the convention layout.

The convention offered a great number of activities for its guests. We had table top war gaming on both Saturday and Sunday, a number of different role playing games, trading card game tournaments, video games (both for casual play and tournaments), a board game area where people could just play some games and meet new people, and anime (Japanese cartoons) screenings for people to relax a bit in between events.

We had some great guests too! Francesca Dani, a professional cosplayer (dressing up as characters from games or series) came to our convention to host a panel and answer any questions cosplayers might have, she also helped judge our cosplay competition during the convention.

There was also a Swedish mangaka (comic artist) host a very informative workshop on how to draw urban and city backgrounds on the Saturday. She also did a panel on the 18th discussing manga (Japanese comics) and its high popularity in Sweden, which was both enlightening and entertaining.

Other events including a Rock Band tournament, displayed on the Jean Monnet Theatre's massive projector screen and

judged by a few of our less tone deaf committee members. This seemed to be off to a bad start with technical problems but it came together in the end and the bands really got the crowd going with some very entertaining performances, including a bonus rendition of 'Painkiller' by one Derek Sheedy that wowed everyone and, it is said, was worth the admission on its own.

Between all the events and panels, conference attendees could enjoy some quality shopping thanks to various vendors selling games, merchandise and manga during the convention. Limerick's very own "The Gathering" was out in force, with a large table selling almost every kind of collectible card, war gaming model and sundries. We are very grateful to them for helping us with the card game tournaments, lending us their knowledge of the tournament rules and allowing players' performances to rank them on the worldwide leader board if they so wished.

It wasn't all fun and games, though. Conventions like these typically have strong charitable elements, and BroCon 2010 was no different. One of our most anticipated events was a charity auction for suicide prevention group, 'Be Aware! Prevent Suicide', based in Killarney and offering information to those suffering from depression. The auction was a great success, with many people bidding outrageous sums of money on the items donated by generous guests and traders. The sought-after lots included VIP tickets to similar conventions around Ireland including WarpCon, ItzaCon and LepreCon, as well as several one-of-a-kind artefacts; not least the Perpetual Shield of our dear departed LUGCon.

Overall, BroCon 2010 can definitely be remembered as a massive success and all the staff of both Societies had huge fun running it. Our sincere thanks to Plassey Campus Centre for their assistance and the UL Arts & Sports fund for their generous funding. This year paves the way for making the convention even larger in 2011 and hopefully for many years to come.

With a successful indoor season already under the UL Archery Clubs belts we dug our heels in and prepared for a tough outdoor season this year, which culminated on the August Bank Holiday weekend with the Outdoor National Target Championships and another National Champion for UL.

ULAC now adds a third National Champion to our ranks this year. Craig Tyner, 2nd year Product Design & Technology, is the 2010 Senior Male Barebow Champion, Niall Boland, 1st year Law & Accounting, the 2010 Junior Male Compound Champion Indoor and now Mike Curtin, 3rd year Robotic Engineering, is the 2010 Junior Male Recurve Champion Outdoor. The most amazing thing to note is that none of these archers had ever shot before joining the UL Archery Club and are now some of the top level archers in Ireland. With UL Archery ranked in the top three college clubs in Ireland and the 2010/2011 Intersivity season only a few short months away there is no rest for our elite team as we prepare for another wave of competitions and, hopefully, more trophies.

If you think that you would like to be involved in a club that trains hard, and plays hard, call down to us during the Clubs & Societies Recruitment Fair in the UL Arena and sign up. You will get access to everything you need to become the next Robin Hood equipment, coaching and your own band of Merry Men. ULAC compete in the ISAA Intersivity League, the National Irish Archery League, the National Championships, the Barebow Championships, the Irish Student Championships, the Irish Open, Indoor and Outdoor, and the National Target Championships. We also run the Apprentices and Masters Cup Leagues within the club, along with our Pro-Am Tournament. There are plenty of chances to compete throughout the academic year and into the summer months, and our archery competitions will take you all over

Ireland, from Dundalk to Cork, Galway to Carlow.

If you are the kind of person who shies away from competition then dont discount ULAC as your club of choice. Our archers are never pressurised to compete and if you just want to shoot for a few nights throughout the semester and blow off a little steam then youll fit right in with our social archers who shoot just for fun and to meet some new people within the college. Our social archers help organise the fun shoots such as balloon shoots, animal target shoots, our Annual Santa Shoot and our National Halloween Shoot. They are also responsible for making sure that plenty of archers meet up after training to get to know each other in a more social setting. There are also plenty of impromptu movie nights; pizza nights and birthday get togethers throughout the year.

UL's Ultimate Frisbee team, the UL Ninjas attended Windmill Windup in Amsterdam for the 3rd year in a row this June. This is Europe's biggest ultimate tournament on grass, with 79 clubs from all corners of Europe in attendance for 3 days of ultimate Frisbee, camping and craic. In a way this tournament is the highlight of our year. After a long season of training, domestic competition and Saturday nights, Windmill Windup becomes our "let your hair down" tournament where having a laugh comes first!

That's not to say the domestic circuit isn't fun but having spotted such potential in our young team we put a certain amount of emphasis on results this season. This paid off with victory at DCU's beginner tournament, Whacking Day, and Development Intervarsities, held in Santry. We also improved on last year's rankings at the Cork Open in October, our own Siege of Limerick in February and topped it off with a 6th place finish at National Intervarsities.

So for the majority of this year's squad Windmill Windup 2010 was to be the biggest tournament we've ever seen and promised to be a crazy couple of days in Amsterdam. With an unfortunately

small squad we found the Frisbee playing bit quite tough, playing higher seeded international opposition in 90 minute games in humid conditions. By Saturday, temperatures were soaring and our squad were out on their feet - Yet we managed to keep the score lines respectable enough. By Sunday we basically had to be dragged to the pitches, again, in the final huddle Club President, Conor Carey got MVP despite Max Vizard bringing his A-Game. Friend of the Ninjas, Eamon was voted Most Spirited Player and Most Gangster Player went to Niall McCarthy, on a very White-Boy weekend!

With our games finished for the weekend and us showered and dressed, we dragged 2 couches to the sideline for the open final, to watch some of the highest standard Ultimate we'd ever seen. Then, with the tournament wrapped, we packed up and headed to our hostel in Amsterdam's city centre. We took it easy on Sunday night, having a few drinks, exploring the Red Light District and sampling Amsterdam's famous cafés. On Monday we got to watch The Netherland's World Cup opener in a packed square near our hostel and on Tuesday, we burned a few hours in a café favoured by

last year's group before starting the long and winding journey back to Ireland.

So what about next season? We've got a name for recruiting talented young players to uphold and a squad full of potential to add to! We also have ambitions to defend our Beginner and Development titles and to improve on our standings at open competition and Intervarsities. As well as that we have big plans to further develop our own open tournament The Siege of Limerick. Then we plan to attend another foreign tournament. Windmill Windup is almost a certainty with rumours of a trip to the USA in the next few seasons circling the mill.

Kayaking through the second largest gorge in the World!!



Summer 2010 has been one of the most successful times for UL kayak club. The club, in its almost 30 year's existence, remains active though the summer months, despite its members being spread across the country. From the time of exams right up until September when college starts again it's always a hive of activity down in the boat house or on the rivers across Limerick. This year, only two days after exams finished ULKC embarked upon its biggest and maddest summer trip ever.

Normally ULKC heads away to the Alps after summer exams to experience some serious white water kayaking and leadership skills, where the water required for white water kayaking is guaranteed. However the summer of 2010 changed this routine, when we extended our Alps trip to accommodate a multiday trip over to the Balkan country of Montenegro. A total of 26 people travelled to the Alps where we spent time in Slovenia and Italy. 18 people then travelled to Montenegro to take part in the adventure which was to become a first for ULKC, or any Irish club.

We spent 3 days on class 2-3 white water, carrying all our necessary supplies with us in our kayaks. Not to mention, this trip took place in the world's second largest canyon,

second only to the Grand Canyon in North America. Nobody had ever imagined going to Montenegro, let alone driving there and kayaking in this beautiful place. The two weeks spent in Slovenia and Italy previous to Montenegro had prepared everyone, as there were many first years on the trip that had never kayaked before arriving in UL. However, this didn't stop anyone from learning and gaining confidence on Alpine waters. Thanks to the many experienced kayakers upon the trip, first years quickly gained safety knowledge, experience and skills to read and run rivers safely, all vital to future of the kayak club. This multiday trip is to become the start of something new for the club. Down the line we hope to go to India and further afield, building up our experience every year. ULKC is at the fore front in Irish kayaking regarding training, experience and safety.

When we arrive back home in Ireland after 4 weeks away, we were soon greeted with rain, typical Irish summer weather you might think. This rain allowed us to go kayaking on the Clare Glens, a famous and popular section of river just across the Tipperary/Limerick border, about 20 km from Limerick. Many club members who live in or close to Limerick got to paddle the Glens several times while other members, who are scattered around the country, were lucky enough to catch a run or two on the Glens when the weather suited. The Glens offers many waterfalls and extreme rapids which adds the excitement of the run!

The Liffey decent is Irelands largest kayak race with around 1000 participants every year. The race attracts national and international participants, the Liffy Descent, is being held in Dublin on the first weekend in September. Last year, two club members did remarkably well by reaching the top 4. This year many of ULKC members are taking part in this marathon

race again and are training out on the river Shannon just behind UL, known locally to club members as "the outback".

Planning has already commenced for the upcoming year in ULKC's calendar. There will be many weekend trips including a fresher's surf kayak trip to Lahinch in week five. Fresher sessions out back in UL, behind the Boat house, will also be commencing early in semester one. They will be running every Tuesday and Wednesday from 15h-17h and again at 17h-19hr. Fresher Pool sessions in the university arena pool will take place every Tuesday night from 21:45h to 22:45h. If you are interested in becoming a part of the kayak club and learning and experiencing something totally insane and outright cool then come along to the recruitment drive which is going to be held in the University Arena, Wednesday of week 3. And bring some friends. Don't forget, you don't need to have kayaked before to join. EVERYONE is welcome. MBUL camping, trials riding and shenanigans



The UL mountain bike club, MBUL, has been in action in UL for over 10 years. The club covers all aspects of mountain biking from getting people who have never ridden a mountain bike before riding safely off road to people with years of experience who want to improve their skills. Different types of biking covered include downhill, cross country, enduro, trials and street riding. The club has its own bikes and helmets available for club members to use on club spins, so the initial difficulty many people have in getting their hands on a good mountain bike isn't a problem for new members. The past summer has been one of the busiest summers we have had since the club started.

The club hosted its 3rd National Points Series cross country race on the 6th June this summer with over 100 competitors travelling from as far a field as Belfast to take part. The Elite category race was won by Irish Olympian Robin Seymour. The event saw cross country racing at the highest level seen in Ireland and one of only two NPS races held outside of Leinster or Northern Ireland this year. The club was complimented on the challenging race course we set for the event as well as the huge trail building effort we put in to make the racecourse weather proof. The course was described as 'a mountain biker's mountain bike course' by one of the competitors, definitely a high compliment for a course put together by a club that does not exist for the sole purpose of racing. Some videos of the course are available in youtube if you search for 'MBUL NPS 2010'.

Every year for the past five years, MBUL has travelled to the Alps in France in order to gain valuable experience riding downhill and enduro. The past summer has been one of the busiest summers we have had since the club started. Every year for the past five years, MBUL has travelled to the French Alps. Some members use this time to work on their downhill skills using the custom built downhill runs, while others use it as an opportunity to explore the vast number of trails and paths while simultaneously taking in the wonderful scenery of the region. The ski resorts in the area keep the ski lifts running all summer carrying bikes to the top of custom built downhill and slope style runs. The club downhill bike comes into its own on this trip as it is purpose designed to go down hills fast, but very heavy to pedal uphill. Everyone who takes the trip returns to Ireland having learned new biking skills and naturally all the undergraduate students who took the trip had their travel costs subsidised.

The second big club event we undertake every year is to go to a 24 hour relay race. This year we travelled to the Bontrager 24/12 near Plymouth in England. We entered two teams, one of which entered the 24 hour pairs category and the other entered the just for fun category as their main aim was to take in the atmosphere of the event rather than for the racing. The overnight rain turned the racecourse quite muddy, but the teams ploughed on regardless, finishing 6th in the pairs category and 9th in the just for fun category. Washing the bikes in the river was

about the best way to keep them running between laps.

MBUL is the only mountain bike club in Ireland with a significant number of biketrials riders. The sport is very obscure in Ireland, but in continental Europe and the UK it is a relatively popular branch of mountain biking. Two trials riders from the club travelled to Wales to take part in the 'Tartydays' trials riding weekend. This is a social event sponsored by Tartybikes, an online trials shop, where trials riders from all around the UK got together for a weekend of camping, trials riding and shenanigans. Since there are of the order of 10 people who ride trials in Ireland in total, it was brilliant to meet other trials riders and spend a weekend where trials is the dominant sport for the area. To make the event even better, the entry fee went directly to charity.

Closer to home the club also contributes towards developing safe cycling in Limerick through the Limerick Cyclists group and the club also put on a trials riding demo in Limerick city as part of the national bike week events.

MBUL cycles every Sunday starting from the boathouse at 11am as well as holding at least one mid-week cycle every week. There are trials and street riding sessions as well as training sessions held as required for new and established members too. The club social night is every Monday, where we get together in the common room over the shop or in the Scholars bar for pizza. Then Skydive UL is the club for you! We are the first ever Third level Skydiving Club in the Republic of Ireland and have gone from strength to strength since it was formed in 2007, even winning the UL Students Union Best New and Improved Club for 2008!

We train students of UL to do their first skydive, most of whom have no experience in skydiving before! We can accommodate everyone, someone who wants a once off skydive or someone with the aim of becoming a licensed skydiver!

The initial training session takes only six hours, and then we can take you to the skies. Every week, we conduct Solo Skydive Courses at the Skydive Ireland Centre which is only twenty minutes from UL. The Course teaches you everything you need to know about how to do your skydive safely. So even if you have never jumped out of a plane before, you can do our Solo Skydive as your first jump. Your first Skydive is something to remember. We capture that moment by having it recorded on digital video and photographed on high resolution digital images so you can show everyone the adventure that you have experienced with Skydive UL.

As part of your training you will learn about the parachute system, how to exit the plane, how to fly the parachute and navigate to the ground safely. We prepare you for everything you need to know for your first skydive.

After a minimum of just 25 jumps you can complete student status and become a qualified Skydiver, known as your 'A' Licence Certificate of Proficiency. This qualification is recognised worldwide and so you are then licensed to skydive anywhere in the world.

We also teach members how to pack their own parachute at Parachute Packing Classes which are held weekly on campus. It is a requirement for members to be able to pack their own parachute in order to get their "A" Licence plus it also makes your skydiving experience even cheaper.

We train on campus and at the Skydiving Centre where our skydiving also takes place which is only twenty minutes drive from UL. We jump every Wednesday and on the weekends! Not only do we skydive regularly in Ireland but we also travel abroad around Europe for skydiving camps to sharpen our skills and bring up beginner skydivers to new levels in the sport!

Every year, we travel to the south of France for 1-2 weeks with both beginner and intermediate skydivers for a training camp. This has proved to be a huge success every year with all the beginners progressing greatly to getting their "A" Licence while on the trip. Other trips include the Christmas trip to Empuriabrava in Spain which is the biggest Dropzone in Europe and also the annual trip to the Body flight Windtunnel in England. Indoor skydiving is an excellent learning tool for Skydivers to learn and perfect new skills that they can then use in the sky.

Members of Skydive UL are very lucky to be able to train with the very best in the sport which include our very own instructors at Skydive Ireland who have years experience in the sport and also the instructors we hire on our trips abroad, some of which are world champion Skydivers!

UL Socialist Youth has had a very good summer, involving protests, international trips and good fun. In June we took part in a very important demonstration in Dublin, against the cuts and bailouts, and in July some of us went off to Belgium meeting with hundreds of socialists and activists from around the world for an international conference. On top of this there is still the Socialist Youth Summer Festival to come, and a sponsored skydive too.

The trip to Belgium, to take part in an international socialist conference organised by the Committee for a Workers' International (CWI), was an inspirational experience. Four hundred socialists from dozens of countries, including Greece, America, Israel/Palestine, Kazakhstan and beyond, all together discussing the events of the last year. We heard eyewitness reports from the mass movements that have erupted in Greece, where hundreds of thousands have taken a stand against the cuts, and come out in three general strikes so far this year.

Learning about the movements around the world in the discussion on defending education we heard from activists in Germany and Austria who had been involved in mass movements there, including university occupations, against cuts and commercialisation of education. These protests have pointed the way forward for young people and workers in Ireland in fighting back against the attacks on wages, dole and public services.

It wasn't just inspiring speeches about the global fight back though, there was also very interesting and important discussion on the causes of the crisis, and the solutions to it. The crisis, it was argued was caused not just by the greed and speculation of big business and the rich, but by capitalism itself which is based on this greed. The response of governments across the world of slash and burn will not only savage public services and peoples livelihoods, but will in fact make the crisis worse.

Speaking in one of the sessions, one of our members reported on the situation facing young people in Ireland, where not only are university fees rising and services being cut, but hundreds of thousands of young people are facing unemployment or emigration even with a degree because of the crisis caused by the rich and their puppets in government. We reported that in Ireland Socialist Youth trying to encourage young people to get organised to fight for a decent future, and to discuss the alternatives to the policies of the right wing parties.

Meeting Joe Higgins MEP at the European Parliament

While in Belgium, ULSY was invited by Socialist Party MEP Joe Higgins to visit the European Parliament and hear about the work he and the Socialist Party are involved in there. Not only did we get the full tour, but we also heard about the various campaigns and protest movements that the Socialist Party (which we are the youth section of) has been supporting through the European Parliament. We heard of how the big food companies recently spent €1billion buying up votes to block plans for firmer rules governing food labelling, and about the EU's criminal inaction over Israel's recent slaughter of peace activists bringing aid to Gaza.

Taking to the streets, protesting for jobs & a future

But Socialist Youth is far from a talking shop. For us discussions, debates, film showings and socialising are all great and very important, but it also important to put these ideas into practice.

With that in mind ULSY members took out the clubs and societies mini bus and went up to Dublin on the 26th of June to join a very important march there. The protest was part of a European-wide week action, against the cuts and bailouts and raising the need for solidarity and united action by workers and young people across Europe.

Joe Higgins, Socialist Party MEP and initiator of the protests along with 15 other MEPs, argued at the demo that young people, workers and the unemployed must not pay for the crisis, and must refuse to be divided between country or sector, race or religion.. We should not accept what he called the 'dictatorship of the markets' where government policy is determined not by the needs and desires of ordinary people but by attempts to 'satisfy' the markets. The protest got the support of a huge array of left wing and community groups across Europe, and registered the need for European wide solidarity and protest. Now, on September 29th the Trade Unions across Europe are following suit and calling a day of protest, something which we in ULSY want to build for and organise protests around here in Limerick and Ireland.

And more to come!

And, as I write, there is still more to come. On top of all that, we have more days out organised for the summer. For one, there is a fundraising skydive organised in conjunction with Skydive UL to help us fund these activities. Also, from the 20-22 of August ULSY members will attend the Socialist Youth national summer festival in Rathdrum, Co. Wicklow. This annual event brings together young people north and south, sick of war, cuts, unemployment, inequality and the corrupt capitalist politicians, to discuss the key issues facing young people and what we can do about them. There will be discussions on the economic crisis, the environment, youth unemployment, women's liberation and a whole host of other issues. It is well timed to send us all back into our schools, universities and workplaces after the summer reenergised and ready to build strong, vibrant and active Socialist Youth groups.

In the coming year, ULSY will be organising on campus, campaigning on diverse issues such as the environment, fees and the bank bailouts and organising meetings, debates and film showings to discuss socialist ideas. We'll be participating in the Clubs and Societies fair in Week 1. If you're interested in our ideas and activities, join ULSY and help us build the fightback.

Socialist Youth will be having a free film showing on Clubs & Socs recruitment Drive day (Wednesday Week 1) at 8pm in UL Students Union Room 2 to welcome all those interested in finding out more about the society. LIFE-CHANGING EVENTS THAT PIECES OF PAPER CAN NEVER MEASURE

I have two pieces of paper to prove that I spent nine years at the University of Limerick. One of them confirms that I graduated. History, Politics and Social Studies was created as a new degree in 1997 and I was in the inaugural class of this cross-disciplinary and inventive programme. The other one says that I have a PhD in politics but I always wanted it to say that I am a doctor in corruption. It sounds better. These parched documents are framed somewhere and verify that I can indeed read and write good. But the piece of paper that I don't have is the one that I'm the most proud of from those nine years. Involvement in clubs and socs makes you think outside of yourself and grants you the possibilities of hundreds of adventures that ultimately make you what you become.

On the clubs side, there was the obligatory kayak weekend trip to Lahinch, THE inauguration to college life. The learning how to Scuba Dive in Kilkee and getting capsized with the sailing club on Lough Derg. Playing midfield for the University of Limerick ladies GAA team and the attempts to learn rugby with UL Bohs. I even

discovered how to play rollerblade-hockey and ride a horse. Two very different things apparently.

I was fortunate to share a campus with a fantastic group of dynamic and energetic people who did innovative things just for the hell of it. One such person was Paddy McHugh, who had lived several life times by the time he left UL. Every University has a pied piper who leads others by just being themselves—irreverent, mischievous but ever so casually holding that quality of simply enjoying life with that healthy dose of being very good at being awkward. Therein, he forced those around him to challenge themselves. McHugh was Mr. Society, incarnate. Queerbash was just one of his babies. But God decided over the summer that the earth was no longer big enough for him and he no longer plays his tunes or dances his reels in this lifetime.

Paddy and I lived together for about two and a half years. He was big into his dreaming of things that never were and asking why not. It's very difficult to live with that wonderful approach to life if you don't join in, head first.

His enthusiasm corrupted those around him to do extraordinary things.

With a very committed and industrious committee, I helped organise a Crime Forum under the auspices of the Peace Society. The purpose of our event was to try and directly engage with events in our city rather than living as an island in Castletroy.

We leafleted the city estates with invitations and had over 600 at the meeting in the Jean Monnet. Vincent Browne chaired one of the most passionate debates I've ever been at. Browne then reran the debate on his RTÉ radio show as he had then. Live 95fm recorded the event and aired it the next day on morning radio. The local newspapers covered it too.

That Peace Society did so many imaginative things. We raised €10,000 for UN affiliated educational projects in South Lebanon and another \$10,000 for educational projects in Costa Rica and Nicaragua. With self-raised funds and a small clubs and socs grant, we had the incredible opportunity to visit these projects first hand.

Life-changing events that pieces of paper can never measure.

And when the Prime Minister of China visited the University of Limerick, our society organised a protest about Tibet that swelled into a couple of hundred students. The former President, Roger Downer, intervened and we were granted a formal meeting with the Chinese Ambassador to Ireland to discuss our concerns. We met him in one of the very nice rooms in the library. Paddy was delighted with himself.

That was the same year that we were both nominated for Society person of the year. Neither of us won but in so many other ways,

we had already won. It was the best award I never received. It was like getting officially rewarded for doing stuff that we loved doing anyway. That felt like cheating in a way.

Thank you to clubs and societies for the memories. Oh, and thanks UL for those pieces of paper. They came in handy.

A final farewell to Patrick McHugh

One of my favourite songs is the Sunscreen Song, and as with most people it's because the lyrics for the most part are relevant and the longer you are around more of it seems to make more sense. There is a particular line that is relevant to everybody and that is

"The real troubles in your life are apt to be things that never crossed your worried mind; the kind that blindsides you at 4pm on some idle Tuesday"

This was certainly the case this summer when we got word here in the Students Union that our former friend and colleague Paddy Mc Hugh had been diagnosed with an aggressive form of cancer. From the time the news broke it really was frightening how quickly Paddy succumbed and within a very short few weeks he was gone by June 6th 2010, aged just

32. Paddy will be sorely missed and a larger than life character and very much someone you heard coming before you actually saw him but it was always interesting to have Paddy breeze in to the Students Union with another opinion (he had lots of those), problems, suggestions or simply idle conversation-either way it was always entertaining and I'll miss his company for that reason, as I am sure many people will.

"Enjoy your body. Use it every way you can. Don't be afraid of it or of what other people think of it. It's the greatest instrument you'll ever own. Dance, even if you have nowhere to do it but your living room." Paddy was an all-Ireland champion dancer and a talented musician. A founding member of Gan Anim, UL's own Irish traditional music society which had lapsed prior to Paddy landing on campus, and in his time it became the first UL Society to win an award at the Board of Irish College Societies Awards 2005. He also took the LGB by the scruff of the neck and re-branded it "Out In UL" and its now trademark event "Queerbash" all legacies to Paddy. He also turned his hand to Kayaking, Outdoor Pursuits and I am sure others I can't remember? He was a

member of our Boathouse Referendum Committee 2003, Clubs & Societies Executive, a chairperson for Clubs & Societies Council, Best Society Person of the Year in 2006/2007 and eventually ended up Campaigns and Services Officer for the Students Union in 2007/2008. He graduated from UL with a BA in Irish Music & Dance in 2007 and after his time in the Union pursued an MA in NUIG in Advocacy and Activism, no surprise there.

Even though Paddy was gone from UL a couple of years he always called in or was seen around the campus every couple of months. Paddy's indignant pose of hand on hips I always referred to as his "my little tea-pot" routine and given the fact that Paddy was as gay as Christmas we often had a good laugh at this starting stance as he prepared to raise his next issue with you. I have many abiding memories of Paddy and I have met many really sound people through Clubs & Societies over the years but none as colourful.

U.L TaeKwonDo Club - A Korean Adventure

While other students relaxed and enjoyed their mid-term break this Easter, the University of Limerick TaeKwonDo Club put their week's break towards fulfilling the dream of many a martial artist: - to travel to the birthplace of TaeKwonDo, immerse themselves in the culture and spirit of the Land of the Morning Calm and train with some of the greatest martial art practitioners in the world. In other words, a training week in South Korea!

South Korea: - a name to conjure with, especially for Western Europeans. It evokes images of pagodas, soaring mountains, Buddhist monks, soaring skyscrapers, information superhighways and martial arts. Located on a peninsula between mainland China and Japan, South Korea boasts a population of some 48 million people, 23 million of which live in or around the capital, Seoul, making it one of the largest megacities in the modern world. Occupying 100,032 square kilometres, 70% of which is rolling hillside or mountainous terrain, South Korea boasts one of the oldest cultures and societies in the world, tracing their ancestry back in an unbroken lineage some 4,500 years. TaeKwonDo, or the Art of Hand And Foot Fighting, is a Korean martial art which has been in existence in several forms since the 4th century A.D. Originating from the Korean martial art Tae-Kwon, surviving underground as a

forbidden art during the Japanese occupation of Korea in the middle ages, and reborn into its current form in 1945 following the defeat of the Japanese at the end of WWII and the liberation of Korea, TaeKwonDo has a huge international following, being practiced in over 188 countries, with conservative estimates of 70 million practitioners across the globe. It is also one of only 2 martial arts world-wide to be recognised in the

official Olympic Games.

With all this history, energy and legend, it is small wonder that a chance to train in South Korea is seen by many as the pinnacle of a martial arts career. U.L TaeKwonDo Club members certainly thought so, with 12 club members packing their dobulks and gladly under-taking the day-long journey to travel the 6,000 miles needed to put them in another world: - South Korea. Spending 5 days in Seoul and 2 days in Gyeongju, ancient capital of the Silla Dynasty in Korea, the week was a resounding success for the club and its members. Training with the Korean Tigers in Seoul, the country's national TaeKwon Do demonstration team was the opportunity of a lifetime: - words are not sufficient to describe the dedication, skill, grace and ability of these ultimate martial artists. In addition to training in Seoul, as part of the Gyeongju visit, the entire club spent 24 hours in the Gulguksa Temple Stay program, where the club were afforded the chance to train with and experience life amongst the Zen Buddhist monks. Living the monastic lifestyle for 24 hours certainly helps gain a new perspective on life: - 4am call to prayers, buddhist chanting, twice-daily SunModo (Buddhist Martial Arts) training sessions, vegetarian dishes and 108 bows to the Buddha were all par for the course during our stay. A truly amazing experience!

With all the training, the club still found time to slow down and experience life in this most amazing country. TaeKwonDo is to Korea what G.A.A is to Ireland: - a part of the national psyche. In a country where most males serve 2 years military service by the age of 24, and TaeKwonDo is taught as part of the military programme daily, many people leave college/military service with a black belt in

TaeKwonDo. The club members soon got used to being stopped on the street by random people who noticed the TaeKwonDo badges, and many an interesting conversation on the martial arts would ensue! Not only did the club partake in their own training sessions, 2 martial arts demonstration shows were also attended which showcased the best and the brightest in the martial arts: - amazed and awed only begin to describe reactions to some of the skills involved. In addition to all this, a day trip to Panmunjeon and the DMZ (Demilitarized Zone), the 38th parallel and the border between North and South Korea, this helped give the club another perspective on this always interesting country and people.

The week in Korea passed all too soon, and before the club knew it, it was time for bags to be packed, farewells to be made and a return trip back to be undertaken. With lasting memories of an amazing trip and a wonderful country and people, the members of the U.L TaeKwonDo Club will admit they are richer by far for their trip to the Land of the Morning Calm.

Being weightless in the ocean feels like flying



The University of Limerick Sub Aqua Club (ULSAC) is a scuba diving club affiliated with the Scottish Sub Aqua Club (ScotSAC), through which we offer members comprehensive dive training and qualifications from absolute beginner level all the way up to instructor level as well as dozens of diving opportunities

annually both in Ireland and abroad. Named the Club of the Year in 2008/9, ULSAC provides a great way to meet and make new friends, and learning to dive is an empowering and thrilling experience. Getting to breathe underwater is an unexplainable sensation, and being weightless in the ocean feels like

flying; you will always remember your first open-water dive.

ULSAC provides incredible opportunities for dive travel in both warm and cold water. Some of our favourite annual trips are to Spain and Scotland for open water training and a week on a diving live-aboard yacht in the Red Sea for qualified



members. The destinations we choose for training are constantly changing and expanding, and our members have gone on to dive together in places like the Maldives, caverns in Mexico, many places in the Caribbean, Australia, the Arctic Circle and even ice diving in the French Alps!

As UL is so close to the Atlantic coast, we have easy access to many of the best dive sites in Ireland. Our brand-new RHIB (rigid-hulled inflatable boat), the Plassey Bird, purchased in the Spring of 2010, gives us unprecedented freedom to explore the waters off the coast of Ireland and makes it convenient and economical for our divers to explore sites that would otherwise be impossible to reach.

At ULSAC, training is of the highest quality and is provided at a fraction of the cost of other popular diving courses and qualifications. Unlike with other organizations, ScotSAC practical training is conducted one-on-one, at the student's pace.

All ScotSAC qualifications are recognised worldwide. The first qualification new trainees will work towards is the ScotSAC Sports Diver Award. This core qualification equips divers to dive without an instructor (though always with a qualified buddy) to a maximum of 30m safely, in varying conditions. 2010 has been another fantastic year for the UL Vikings. The campaign began in earnest right here in UL, hosting the inaugural intervarsity American Football competition. The competition involved the likes of DCU, UCD and Trinity college all taking part. This competition was a great stepping stone for our rookie players and allowed them to get to grips with the full-contact sport. We eventually faced DCU in the final and won the competition outright.

Next up was the Páidí O'Sé Festival of Football in Dingle, where the Vikings faced the Cork Admirals. This was another stern test for the Vikings, but the end result was the Vikings picking up their second trophy of the year.

The regular season kicked off in March and has seen some epic battles during the course of it, resulting in a semi-final game against the Carrickfergus Knights. This was a hard-hitting game, with both sides keen to book a place in the Shamrock Bowl, but it was the Vikings who prevailed on the day with a 21-0 result. This booked a place in the final against the Dublin Rebels, a fifth consecutive appearance in the All-Ireland by the Vikings.

During the regular season, the Vikings broke new ground with their first ever participation in the Atlantic Cup, the third highest level of European competition for American Football. The competition was held in the sports grounds of UCD and involved teams from Luxembourg, the Netherlands and Belgium.

The Vikings were first drawn against the Dudelange Dragons, the Luxembourg team and only returning team from last year's competition. With a 58-14

victory over the Dragons, the Vikings faced the Leylstadt Commanders from the Netherlands in the final after the Dutch team managed to beat the Brussels Bulls in the semi-final 48-0. It was a close fought final which saw the Vikings come from 18-13 behind to go on to win with a touchdown in the final few minutes of the competition to finish with a score line of 19-18.

This monumental achievement catapulted the Vikings into the European Federation of American Football's (EFAF) Top 20, the first Irish team to do this in 20 years. The scale of this achievement was also recognised by IFAF, the International Federation of American Football, who named the Vikings "Club of the Month" for June. To make the Top 20 out of well over 250 teams is quite an accolade but then to have it recognised by IFAF who has well over 1000 members was simply amazing. With a fifth consecutive appearance in the Shamrock Bowl final the Vikings aim to win a record equalling 4th Bowl in a row and cement their position as the best American Football team in Ireland.

Thank you so much for your extremely generous donation of €250 towards Concern's provision work in Haiti. This is an incredible amount to have funded and our objective to reach Haiti. Please ensure you pass on our thanks to everyone that was involved in all of the efforts, staff and volunteers around the office.

As you know, on January 12th, Haiti was devastated by an earthquake which killed an estimated 200,000 people and left many more 1 million homeless. Concern has been working in Haiti since 1994 so we were able to begin our emergency response immediately. Now, almost 6 months on, we are providing (U.S.) basic needs - food, clean water and sanitation facilities, and temporary shelter - for 75,000 people on a daily basis.

Concern has been involved in the education sector in Haiti since 1998, when it conducted a survey into schools health that formed the basis of a project that was first implemented in the commune of Saint-Jacques and was subsequently extended to the towns of La Grande and the Saint Martin district of Port-au-Prince.

Since the earthquake, Concern has been actively involved in the UN's Education "cluster". We have also responded by providing basic schooling to help schools in Saint-Jacques that have been damaged by the disaster. We plan to restore 2 schools that were destroyed in Saint-Jacques. In mid-March, we launched 2 Child Friendly Spaces in Saint Martin, an area of Port-au-Prince, and two more have opened since. In addition Concern is supporting Temporary Learning Spaces (TLS) and an accelerated learning programme in two areas of the capital where Concern has on-going work: Saint Martin and MARIENAU.

Softball as a game can be divided in batting and fielding. These weekends provide a great opportunity for getting to know other teams from all over the country and for seeing some brilliant games of softball.
